## **SMC Studies, Services and Holy Week Events**

Fr. Lou will continue his Facebook morning prayer on Thursday mornings at 8:30am. About 10-15 people attend per week.

The Lenten Study is Lent for Everyone by N.T. Wright on Wednesdays until Easter in the Parish Hall. The Wednesday morning study will have Eucharist with the study at 10am. The Wednesday evening study will have a shortened Eucharist at 5:30pm and the study will begin at 6pm.

The liturgical color for Palm Sunday is red or purple. During Holy Week purple is used until the church is stripped bare on Maundy Thursday. The church remains stripped bare on Good Friday and Holy Saturday, though black might be used.

## **Easter Egg Hunt**

The Easter egg hunt is back! The event starts at 9am on Saturday, April 16th. The children hunt for plastic eggs by age group, so they will do Easter crafts while they wait for their turn. The annual Easter piñata will again make an appearance, so get ready for the extra excitement!

We will need donations of individually wrapped candy that will fit in Easter eggs. Oversized candy will end up in the piñata. Candy can be chocolate, jellybeans, or caramels. No peanuts please! Please drop off the candy before the packing date.

We will need volunteers to pack the eggs on Tuesday, April 12<sup>th</sup> at 6pm. We will be packing 1000 of them.

We will need volunteers to hide eggs and help at the craft stations. The crafts at the tables are beading, coloring eggs, cookie decorating, felt and foam crafts, and activity books. We already have supplies for the beading and felt craft tables. We will need hard boiled eggs, cookies, cookie decorating supplies, and a few activity books.

#### DOK

The meeting for the DOK on Friday, April 8<sup>th</sup> at 10:30am in the Parish Hall has to be cancelled. We will meet in May.

The DOK class for new or rededicating members will have their last meeting on April 18<sup>th</sup> at 10:00am. The induction will be in August!

The DOK is helping with setting up for the Altar of Repose Prayer Vigil in the Parish Hall. If you would like to drop off plants for the altar of repose, please drop them off by Sunday, April 10<sup>th</sup>. Volunteers are needed to set up the altar of repose on Wednesday, April 13<sup>th</sup> at 1pm, after the Easter flowers will have been picked up.



## Altar of Repose

The **altar of repose** is a temporary altar where the Communion hosts consecrated on Maundy Thursday during the Mass of the Lord's Supper are placed, or "reserved" for use on the following day, Good Friday.

On the night that Jesus instituted the Holy Eucharist (Maundy Thursday), He explained to His disciples that He was about to undertake one of the most difficult trials in His earthly existence. After Supper was ended, He went to the Garden and prayed to the Father for strength to accept what was going to happen. This Garden was called Gethsemane.

Taking His apostles with Him, Jesus asked them to sit, pray and watch with Him, and to offer support as His difficult hour approached: My soul is very sorrowful, said Jesus, even to death; remain here and watch. After the Altar and Church are stripped on Maundy Thursday, the Sacrament is brought in procession to the Parish Hall and laid to rest there in a peaceful setting, symbolic of the Gethsemane Garden. This peaceful, restful setting is called the Altar of Repose.

It has been the historical and traditional practice of the People of God to keep watch from the end of the Maundy Thursday Service, commemorating the Last Supper, through the night, to the beginning of the Good Friday Liturgy, the point in history when the soldiers came to take Christ away to be crucified. We will observe this ancient tradition by offering you the opportunity to keep watch, in one-hour intervals, through the quiet time of the night, from Maundy Thursday evening, through the hours of Good Friday, until 11:30am. This will be a time when you can come and pray, meditate, watch, or do whatever you wish in quiet adoration of the Passion of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Father Lou will provide psalms for those who want them. **Signup Sheets for the Prayer Vigil are in the back of the church, and they are in one-hour increments starting at 8:30pm.** For more information call Fr. Lou.



#### **Tenebrae Service**

Tenebrae (Latin for "darkness" or "shadows") is a religious service held during Holy Week. It has psalms, readings, responsories, with music and meditations. It is characterized by gradual extinguishing of candles, symbolizing the scattering of the disciples and other followers of Jesus during his Passion until only a single candle, considered a symbol of our Lord, remains.

The last candle is left lighted, but it is carried away to be hidden, which signifies the apparent victory of the forces of evil. A sudden loud noise is made at the end of the service, symbolizing the earthquake at Christ's death. The lighted candle is then restored to its place, suggesting Christ's eventual triumph. The music of Carlo Gesualdo da Venosa will be featured at our service. The service should be an hour long. If you have questions, call Erich Kaminsky or Fr. Lou.


# **Sock Ministry**

It is well worth reading and tells Valentin's story from complete atheism to being director of the Baptist Bachelor's degree Pastoral Chaplains' program at the Kyiv Theological Seminary. It's quite a story.

I know that Valentin and another of our friends, Mikola (Nikolai) Dudko, are continuing as far as is possible, even today, to visit and minister to those in hospital in Cherkasy.

# Barbara Breen's CREAMIEST RICE PUDDING

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

3/4 cup uncooked white rice (I use medium grain or basmati rice.)

1 and 1/2 cups water

1/2 tsp salt

1 cup half and half

1 and 1/2 cups milk

4 tbs granulated sugar

2 tbs light brown sugar

1 whole egg and one egg yolk

1 tbs unsalted butter

1/2 tsp vanilla, or a little more if you like

About 2/3 cup regular or golden raisins

Cinnamon to taste

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Cook rice with salt and water according to package directions. When done, whisk together granulated sugar, half and half + 1 cup milk and add to rice. Simmer on low for 20 minutes, stirring every few minutes until thick and creamy. (It may look like it's too much milk and it will never thicken, but it will.)

In a small bowl whisk egg, egg yolk, brown sugar and remaining 1/2 cup milk. Spoon 3 big spoonfuls of the thickened pudding mixture in with the egg mixture and whisk rapidly to temper and prevent scrambling. Once egg mixture is warm, add into pudding mixture. Cook for 3-5 minutes more until thickened up again. Once thickened, remove from heat and add in butter and vanilla. (I also add a little more milk or half and half if it seems too thick.) Fold in raisins and stir in cinnamon or sprinkle on top.
