
SMC Studies, and Services



Karen Love Bible Study

The next Women's Ecumenical Bible Study will begin on **Tuesday**, **March 7 from 4-5:15 pm at St Mary's Parish Hall in Lake Luzerne**, **NY**. It is a **10-week study** on the first half of **Genesis** and the details include:

God of Creation - Bible Study Book (Revised) A study of Genesis 1-11 (Please note: Jen Wilkins has two Genesis book studies. We are doing the first one, which has been revised.)

SUMMARY: The opening lines and chapters of Genesis teach us fundamental truths about God. We watch Him bring light after darkness, order after chaos, and rest after toil—all through the power of His Word.

Over 10 sessions of verse-by-verse study, dive into the first 11 chapters of Genesis by following three critical stages of understanding: comprehension, interpretation, and application. Teaching videos are key in understanding this study. Revisit familiar stories and historical figures, challenge your basic knowledge, and discover deeper meanings in the text. As God reveals Himself through Scripture, we can only begin to understand ourselves when we first glimpse the character, attributes, and promises of our Creator.

OVERVIEW:

God of Creation is a 10-session Bible Study on Genesis 1-11. The study walks you through verse by verse, tracing the themes of creation, fall, redemption, and restoration. There are 5 days of study each week with small group discussion questions at the end of each week and a weekly viewer guide.

AUTHOR:

Jen Wilkin is an author and Bible teacher from Dallas, Texas. She has organized and led studies for women in home, church, and parachurch contexts. An advocate for Bible literacy, her passion is to see others become articulate and committed followers of Christ, with a clear understanding of why they believe what they believe, grounded in the Word of God.



Have you ever wondered about the votive candles at the back of our Church? Have you ever wondered where the Shrine to the Virgin Mary in Walsingham is? Where a lamp burns for us $\mathbb{A} \mathbb{C}$.

In 1061 (5 years before the Norman Conquest in 1066 !!!) in an English village called Walsingham, in Norfolk, East England the lady of the manor, a devout Christian, Richeldis de Faverches, had a series of visions of the Virgin Mary, who showed her the house in Nazareth where the angel Gabriel made his revelation of the forthcoming birth of Jesus. Our Lady asked Richeldis to build a replica of the holy house here in Walsingham. "The Holy House" was built in Walsingham, it was later to become a shrine and place of pilgrimage.

Richeldis's son Geoffrey left in his will instructions for the building of a <u>priory in Walsingham</u>. The priory passed into the care of the <u>Canons Regular</u> of Saint Augustine, sometime between 1146 and 1174. It became a place of pilgrimages for Kings, Lords and nobleman and peasants alike. One of the most popular in all Europe.

At that time in England the history is long and complicated and when linked to the Protestant Reformation it becomes even more so with the suppression of the Monasteries and the break with the Roman Catholic Church.

By the time of its destruction in 1538 during the reign of Henry VIII, the shrine had become one of the greatest religious centers in England and Europe, together with <u>Glastonbury</u> and <u>Canterbury</u>. It had been a place of pilgrimage during medieval times, when due to wars and political upheaval, travel to shrines in Rome and <u>Santiago</u> de <u>Compostela</u> was tedious and difficult.

Nevertheless, before it's destruction, royal patronage helped the shrine to grow both in wealth and popularity, receiving regal visits from the following kings and queen:

- King Henry III
- King Edward I
- King Edward II
- King Henry IV
- King Edward IV
- King Henry VII
- King Henry VIII
- Queen Catherine of Aragon

After it's destruction the Shrine, Church and Abbey stood in ruins for centuries.

By a Papal order on 6 February 1897, Pope Leo XIII blessed a new statue for the restored ancient sanctuary of Our Lady of Walsingham. This was sent from Rome and placed in the Holy House Chapel at the newly built Catholic parish church of King's Lynn (the village of Walsingham was within the parish) on 19 August 1897 and on the following day the first post-Reformation pilgrimage took place to the Chapel at Walsingham, Hundreds of Catholics attended the pilgrimage and committed themselves to an annual pilgrimage (from 1897 to 1934 on Whitsun) to commemorate this event.

A new Anglican Shrine was also built. The feast day of Our Lady of Walsingham is kept on 24 September in both the Anglican and Catholic churches. Anglicans, especially in the <u>Society of Our Lady of Walsingham</u> and at the <u>Anglican shrine</u>, keep an additional feast of translation on 15 October annually, the anniversary of the translation of the image from Walsingham's parish church to the shrine church in 1931.

So after nearly four hundred years the 20th century saw the restoration of pilgrimage to Walsingham as a regular feature of Christian life in the British Isles.

The Anglican Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham was created in 1931 and enlarged in 1938. In 1921, Fr Hope Patten was appointed Vicar of Walsingham. He set up a statue of Our Lady of Walsingham, in the Parish Church of St Mary. It was based on the design of the original statue, as found on the medieval seal of Walsingham Priory.

As the number of pilgrims to the site increased, a new chapel was dedicated in 1931 and the statue was moved to it in an elaborate translation procession on 15 October 1931. The chapel was extended in 1938 to form the current Anglican shrine church.

The shrine church was substantially extended in the 1960s. The church has a holy well known for its healing properties; the act of receiving water from the holy well is often accompanied by the laying on of hands and anointing. Water from the well is often taken home by the faithful and distributed to their family, friends, and parishioners.

Noel and I, many years ago now, visited the Shrine and took part in a Communion service there.
